6 UPDATE FROM DORSET COUNCIL

- New CEO for Dorset Council
 - Dr Catherine Howe was unanimously recommended by the cross-party Staffing Committee. This appointment was approved by Full Council at the last meeting.
- Maumbury Road Works
 - Overnight work under a road closure will take place from the end of April into early May. Unfortunately, it cannot take place in the daytime due to the number of vehicles that use the junction.
 - The roadworks will be completed mid-May.
- Recycling Performance

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• DC has retained its position as the top-performing unitary and disposal authority in England for recycling, based on the national 2023/24 data set published by DEFRA.

- With a recycling rate of 60.5 percent for kerbside waste, significantly above the national average of 44 percent. DC is first among unitary authorities.
- Dorset ranked third nationally for the lowest amount of residual waste collected per household, with just 363 kilograms per household.
- Funding Approved to Accelerate DC transition away from fossil fuels
 - Cabinet has now approved an additional £6 million from our capital budget to accelerate our transition away from fossil fuels. This funding will help us become a greener council and deliver substantial savings, which is crucial in these challenging times.
- New funding opportunities for local community groups
 - If you're looking to kickstart a new project that will make a difference for people in your community, Round 9 of the Community and Culture Project Fund is now open for applications.
 - The grants, which are managed by Dorset Council, welcome applications for projects and events for community, arts, accredited museums, heritage, sport, youth, play and physical activity.
 - This fund offers small grants ranging from £1,500 to £5,000 to support organisations who want to start new activities or events that make a real difference to the lives of Dorset residents, especially those who are marginalised or disadvantaged.
 - The Small Capital Grants Fund to improve, adapt, or refurbish community spaces, village play areas, sports pitches, local greenspaces, arts, or museum venues is also open for applications.
 - This fund provides one-off grants between £5,000 and £15,000
- Local Visitor Economy Partnership (LVEP) accreditation.
 - Dorset has been successful in achieving Local Visitor Economy Partnership (LVEP) accreditation.
 - This will help to unlock growth opportunities for Dorset's billion-pound visitor economy and will give access to a network of support as part of the national LVEP programme. The bid was led by Dorset Council supported BCP Council and Dorset Tourism Association.
 - Dorset's application was approved by Visit England's panel of industry experts and visitor economy policy makers at the Department for Culture, Media and Sport.

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• We had confirmation from Locality that our End of Grant report met their requirements. You'll recall that we spent £4,470.81 out of our grant of £5,342 and the PC has now returned the unspent funding of £871.19. The next grant funding window should open around the end of May and we are in discussion with Amy Burnett about our requirements for this final year.

- 2. Housing Needs Survey
 - We had a good discussion with Jacqui Cuff at our last SG meeting on 24th April about her report on the HNS and this is one of the items for discussion today.
- 3. Community Events
 - We had a stand at the Puncknowle Tea Party held yesterday afternoon at the Crown which gave the opportunity to meet a number of residents and promote the NP.
 - We also used this event to advertise the forthcoming Youth Event. This will take place in the Village Hall in the afternoon of Tuesday 27th May. It will be facilitated by Nikki Northover from Swyre who also leads Bridport Youth Dance. This event should help us get their views on the parish and help us design the survey to go to youngsters. We'll put up posters but would appreciate any help in advertising.
 - One other point on community interactions, this time on Identification of Non-Heritage Assets which you'll recall I raised at a previous meeting. I'm grateful to the Councillors who provided feed-back on our earlier draft letter to owners of these assets. We've revised the draft to reflect this feedback along with that of our consultant and would be grateful for any final comment in the next fortnight. [See overleaf for draft]
- 4. Programme and Upcoming Activities
 - I'm sharing the latest draft Timelines and Milestones for our Programme, as prepared by Paul, to give councillors a better feel for the programme. Given that we won't be able to apply for the final tranche of grant funding for a month or so, we're focussing on things that don't need input from our consultant. We are reviewing the draft Topic papers so that we can consider potential policies in the Plan and hence identify questions for the community survey where we need further evidence.
